Mike,

I am really sorry to bother you, but I have another question. I found out today that 30-foot sea turtle enclosures are installed around each nest on Ocracoke, but have not been installed in other areas of the park. Enclosures ranging from 15-25 feet have been installed around sea turtle nests in other areas of the park (ie, Bodie Island), but the Interim Strategy requires 30-foot enclosures.

It seems that we should be consistent in our application of the enclosure, but if we install 30-foot enclosures around nests at Bodie Island, ORV access will be eliminated. This is the reason that park staff installed smaller enclosures.

In an effort to maintain some ORV access, I think that we need to install 30-foot closures around future nests, adjust closures around existing nests that do not preclude ORV access, and consider the 10 nests on Bodie Island on a case by case basis. This appears to be consistent with the Interim Strategy.
