Hi Alan,

Thank you for your interest in the Draft Cape Hatteras National Seashore Off-Road Vehicle Management Plan / Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS). Please understand that under the NEPA process once a major planning document such as the DEIS is released to the public, NPS does not typically provide responses to individual questions about the document until the release of the final environmental impact statement (FEIS), at which time written responses to substantive comments will be provided as part of the FEIS. That said, I hope to assist you in finding the information you are seeking. Page 124 describes how "points and spits" and "ocean shoreline" non-breeding shorebird areas would be managed. If there are specific items in the DEIS that you think need to be clarified or if you have recommendation(s) for how you think something should be handled, you may wish to include that in your comments.

Mike,

Please provide some explanation to the notes on page 101, Alternative F, Oceanside Location "0.5 miles southwest of Ramp 72 to inlet". The DEIS states:

ORV route YR+
With expected limited access Mar 15 to Jul 31
When pre-nesting area is established, ORV
access corridor would be allowed along ocean
shoreline to the inlet. When shorebird
breeding activity is observed, standard buffers
would apply, which depending upon the
circumstances could close the access
corridor.
+There would be 1.0 mile of "floating" ocean
shoreline area for nonbreeding shorebirds.
Area would be bypassed via the ORV corridor
on the upper beach during nonbreeding
season.

The first part seems to state that we will have oceanside access whenever buffer distances allow. But the note followed by + appears to state that there will be 1.0 mile closed for "non-breeding shorebirds". Since south point is about 1.8 miles from ramp 72, a 1.0 mile closure would effective close the entire ocean shoreline. I measured the distance as shown on the pre-nesting closure map, and I also checked against my truck's odometer to come up with 1.8 miles. Does this mean that we will only have 0.3 miles of the southpoint beach open? Please explain this note.

Currently, there is extensive shoreline closure year-round behind southpoint for breeding and non-breeding birds. How is this area specified in the DEIS?

If possible, please provide clarification on this issue in time for me to communicate to concerned people prior to the public comment period.
