Mike,

I talked to Jon, and he said the actions are what are called for in their interim protected species management plan. They do not follow the PIPL Recovery Plan guidance for pedestrians and chicks (300m) and the only time they've closed the shoreline to pedestrians was when the buffer (150') extended into the intertidal zone, which he says is rarely the case (once). Pedestrian disturbance isn't an issue due to the low visitation and remote areas, but he said in some of the busier areas, if such disturbance were to occur they would close the beach to pedestrians.

Under what circumstances, if any, would they close the shoreline to pedestrians (for example, if there was obvious human disturbance of nets or chicks)?
