Larry,

We have Concurrent Jurisdiction with the State of North Carolina. This means all state laws that do not conflict with federal laws can be enforced by state and federal officers on park lands in N.C.

In addition, NC Regulation 15a NCAC 101.0102 prohibits the taking or possession of any Federally or State listed Endangered, Threatened, or Species of Special Concern. Those bird species found here at Cape Hatteras include the Piping Plover, Gull-billed Terns, American Oystercatcher, Least Tern, and Wilson's Plover.

When I worked for N.C. State Parks at Bald Head Island and Fort Fisher, we used signs that had similar language.

It really does not matter whether federal or state is listed first or second on the sign, especially with Concurrent Jurisdiction.
