Sandy,

I would add:

A pedestrian trail through the interior near the dredge pond would provide less access to Cape Point during the breeding season than the shoreline corridor because of the likelihood the prenesting area would preclude pedestrian travel south of the dune line. NPS has considered various access options for Cape Point and has determined, based on the nesting history in recent years, that the shoreline access corridor described in alternative F is the option most likely to provide access to Cape Point during some portions of the breeding season. For example, during the 2010 breeding season access to Cape Point along the shoreline corridor was closed for a total of 55 days to pedestrians and 69 days for ORVs, whereas the prenesting are was in place (i.e., closed to access) for 145 days.

(Per Resource Closure Request documentation, the prenesting area was installed March 10 and removed August 2.)

In my opinion we should not consider a permanent pedestrian path through this area (between the dunes and the Salt Pond) since I believe it would affect the Park's resources since this would take people right through the middle of known AMOY and PIPL nesting areas. If buffer distances allow, I would more likely consider allowing pedestrians to walk along the shoreline to reach Cape Point. There is an old road at the junction of the Interdunal Road and Ramp 44 that birders use to gain access to a corner of the Salt Pond but it does not allow for access to Cape Point. I would encourage maintenance of this road/trail for birding purposes.

Hi Thayer.

Here is the comment:

I would also suggest that the Park Service consider cutting a permanent pedestrian path from Cape Point to the parking areas at Ramps 43 and 44, and the campground. This path could be cut through the brush between the

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west side of the sand dunes and the east side the pond at Cape Point. This path would have no negative impact on the Park's resources. The path would provide reliable year round access to Cape Point when all other access is lost during times of resource and safety closures. This access would be safer than wading around the enclosures at night and could prove useful for resource observation, predator management and park enforcement.

As I mentioned, my concern about ptentially responding that it's out of scope for this plan and could be considered for the GMP is that we have identified a couple other pedestrian trails in the ORV plan. I'm not familiar enough with the geography there to recognize where the preposed trail route would be in relation to the prenesting closure. That would seem relevant to the feasibility of this suggestion. Any help the Seashore can provide for a draft response would be appreciated. Thanks.
